Travel Stipends for New Orleans

The ELD Development Committee is pleased to announce that Morgan & Claypool Publishers will again be sponsoring travel stipends for ELD members. The stipends for the 2016 conference will be awarded in two phases.

The first phase will take place during the ELD Business Meeting in Seattle, where the names of two stipend recipients will be drawn from those ELD members who have registered for the drawing. The two members selected will be given a deadline by which they must submit confirmation of registration for the 2016 conference. After ELD receives confirmation of registration, an award of \$250 will be sent to each recipient. If a recipient does not attend the 2016 conference, or does not meet the deadline for submitting evidence of registration to ELD, the funds will be given to a runner up, also selected at the Seattle conference. If a recipient registers for the 2016 conference, and is awarded the stipend, but does not attend, the recipient agrees to re-imburse ELD the \$250.

The site is open now, and the deadline for the drawing registration is **Friday**, **May 22**, **2015**, **at 5:00 PM**, EDT. No registrations will be accepted after that time.

In December, we will begin taking applications for the second phase of the travel stipend process. Two awards of \$500 each will be sponsored by Morgan & Claypool Publishers. The funding will be given to those librarians with the greatest need, and applicants will be asked to document their expected level of funding from their institutions. Both \$500 awards are open to all librarians. Stipends will be awarded before the deadline for early-bird registration. More information about these awards will be available in the fall.

Please register now for the \$250 stipend drawing. You do not need to be present in Seattle to win. You only need to have a reasonable expectation that you will attend the 2016 conference to enter the drawing.

The number of subscribers to ELDNET-L is almost identical to that from last year, with a net gain of only one new subscriber.

For ELD-L, the number of ELD members with e-mail addresses who agree to be subbed to the list directly determines the number of list subscribers. Given that a small number of ASEE members who are not librarians choose to join ELD but do not want to be subscribed to ELD-L, the number of ELD-L subscribers will always be a bit lower than the total number of ELD members. After a drop in 2013/14, subscriber numbers for ELD-L have rebounded a bit in 2014/15.

ELD Accreditation & Standards Committee Annual Report, 2015

The main committee project this year has been the creation and distribution of the ABET Visit Survey, led by David Hubbard and the ABET Accreditation subcommittee. The purpose of the survey is to pull together our collective experience so the information and wisdom gained can be made available as a resource for ELD Members who have questions about their potential role in accreditation visits. Preliminary results from the survey may be read in the <u>March 2015 newsletter</u>. We will continue to solicit participation from ELD Members moving forward, in the hopes that as people undertake ABET visits, they will share their experiences.

A&S Committee members have begun discussing what the ACRL's <u>Framework for Information Literacy in</u> <u>Higher Education</u> might mean for ELD. Dave Zwicky led the conversation during our recent committee meeting, beginning with the questions, "How are people using this framework (or thinking about using this framework) in communicating with faculty or students?" and "What would people like to see in terms of help with the framework?"

This conversation begins the process of determining how A&S can be helpful to membership regarding the Framework. It is important to note that the Framework is not intended to replace the ACRL Standards, but to act as a supplemental document. By the same token, the Framework may be seen as Supplemental to the 2013 ELD short document, "Information Competency Standards for Engineering."

News of a change: Due to the budget challenges at the UW Madison, Diana Wheeler's position is being eliminated as of October 31 of this year. The Seattle conference will most likely be her last ASEE conference as an ELD member. **A&S Committee will seek a new Chair after June 2015.**

Membership Committee

As of April 22, 2015 the ELD consists of 228 members. This number is slightly lower than the total membership at this time last year (230).

In the past year, the membership committee has continued to monitor the membership list monthly, sending updates to listserv and directory owners for maintenance. We also contacted all new members, requesting bios to include in the newsletter, sent reminders to all lapsed members to re-join, and contacted all new subscribers to ELDnet-L inviting them to join ELD.

So far, since the sharp increase in conference registration fees, one member has communicated they are not continuing in ELD directly because of the costs. We will monitor the membership trends closely as the year

Awards

The Engineering Library Division of ASEE Awards Committee is pleased to announce the following 2015 award winners: Michael Fosmire and David Radcliffe. Integrating Information into the Engineering Design Process. Purdue University Press, 2014. A librarian who nominated the book stated this about it: "[The book] has been indispensable for me this year. I am a relatively new engineering librarian and this book helped me greatly in understanding the needs of engineers when they are undertaking their capstone projects. It also was very helpful to me when preparing workshops for students. Although I've only had the book for less than year, it is already well worn from constantly reading and rereading it." A member of the Awards Committee commented "I don't know of any other book like this – I know I'll be referring to it often in my own instruction work, and referring engineering faculty to it."

Scholarly Communication Committee report – 2014/2015

The Scholarly Communication Committee wasn't very active this past year. In July 2014 a call was made for new members for the group. The response was huge, and as a result there was significant change to the committee's membership.

In October, the Committee was asked to review and comment on the first draft of a scholarly communication survey geared toward the membership of three library groups. As a result of comments received by seven Committee members through early November, there was substantial editing done to the survey structure and questions. It took many weeks to get approval for the survey through Virginia Tech's IRB, but that was finally received, some very slight last edits were done to the text, and the survey was disseminated in early April, 2015 to ASEE ELD, ACRL STS, and ACRL EBSS. Preliminary results of the survey hopefully will be presented as a lightning talk at this summer's conference.

Looking forward to Robyn Rosenberg taking the reins of this group starting this summer.

Mentoring committee report

The ELD Mentoring committee considered the following ideas during the 2014-2015 academic year.

Ways librarians assist students with design projects, noting student diversity, interdisciplinary group work, and citation management.

Group work: It is required, groups are often ethnically and culturally diverse, and some design projects involve a wide range of disciplines.

Citation management: Engineering/science content from library databases is recorded in citation management software. Videos and design information (patents, costs, business forecasting, statistical information) found on the web also require citation.

Time management: Time management skills enable students to timely and efficiently organize citations and complete projects. Librarians can assist students with their time management skills, depending on availability.

Ways we create the relationship structure for mentor/mentee, and the intended benefit for both parties.

Consider activities (co-publishing and co-presenting papers and posters) and communication (telephone, goto-meeting software). Align these relationships (how many?) prior to the June 2015 conference. In May 2016, have each mentee's goals in-hand, prepared to discuss the year's accomplishments. We might be able to complete some matching at the Unconference, Seattle Public Library on June 14th.

How we might proceed.

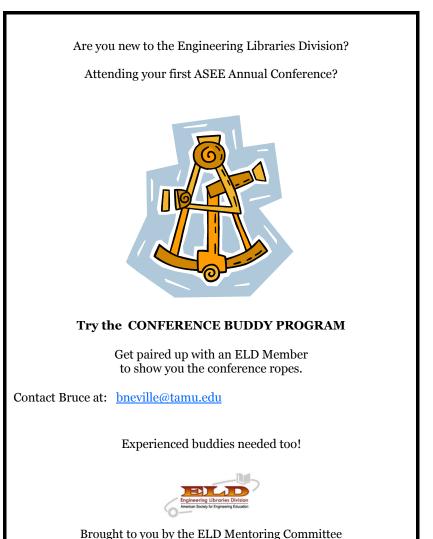
Work more closely with membership committee. Ensure that they continue to notify us about new members; we will follow up with a welcome email/letter. Joint events might serve as one such initiative that we can plan, develop, and execute.

Talk to new ELD member librarians. Ask about their jobs and what helps them acclimate to their new roles. Do they rely on a supervisor or peer/s to mentor, advise, or suggest developmental ideas? What inspires professional development? Suggest ELD opportunities. Consider using an anonymous-survey software to obtain feedback from librarians with less than five years' experience.

Attract new members from the ranks of newly hired engineering librarians, using US News & World Report, recent job ads (a few months following a recent post), CR&L News listing of new hires, and other sources to create lists.

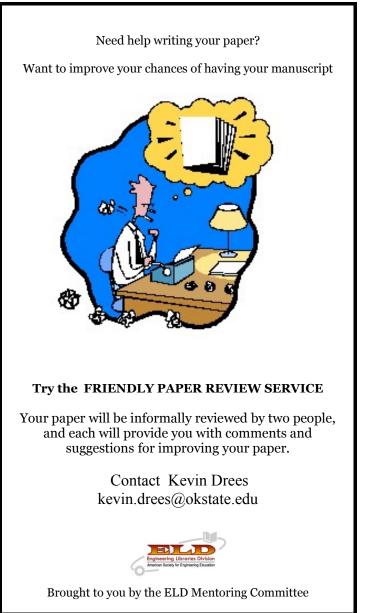
New Member Biographies
