



The Engineering Library has moved for the second time in four years and has come to rest in the new Media Union. Actually, "rest" is the wrong word, since things are still hopping as we integrate with the Art & Architecture Library, the Computer Aided Engineering Network, and the Information Technologies Division.

The building, though located on the North Campus of the University, serves the U. of M. community as a whole, and features gallery space, videoconferencing facilities, virtual reality labs, audio and video production studios, training rooms, and a variety of programs to go along with the equipment.

Big numbers: With over 400 workstations, 800 seats, 1800 network connections, 2500 journal titles, and 600,000 volumes, we do a good job of filling up our 250,000 square foot facility.


A smaller number with big implications: we are a 24-hour operation, both on the web (at http://www.ummu.umich.edu/library) and in person.

Though the majority of my staff comes from the former Engineering Library, and we have retained our mission of serving the College of Engineering, our role has expanded a great deal and we now interact with more -- and more varied -- customers.

Ruth Seidman has been named a fellow of the Special Libraries Association. This award is given in recognition of leadership in the field of special librarianship and for outstanding contributions and expected future service to the Association. Ruth is the head of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Engineering and Science Libraries. (C & R L News, September 1996) This fall the Reference/Instruction librarians at the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth inaugurated an electronic classroom. This classroom is used exclusively by the librarians. The classroom capabilities feature internet connections, including the world wide web, and access to the University's OPAC and CD network. Instruction can be controlled from central workstation or from the individual stations. The 19 Mac stations are arranged to permit multiple seating at each station. The room also has the nonelectronic accessories of a blackboard and a large central table for discussion and activities.

Anne Fullerton is a co-investigator with Gloria Leckie, Graduate School of Library and Information Science, University of Western Ontario, on an ALAfunded research project, the 1996 Baber award. The research investigates science and engineering faculty attitudes and pedagogical practices with regard to information literacy. They have sent a survey to 800+ faculty at the the University of Waterloo and University of Western Ontario and will be following up in the winter term with interviews of faculty from each university in order to explore their attitudes and perceptions in more depth. They hope the findings will clarify the expectations and roles of librarians and faculty in teaching information literacy skills to undergraduate students and suggest how and when this education should be incorporated into the curriculum.
