

Committee Annual Reports

Accreditation & Standards Committee

The Accreditation & Standards Committee continues to investigate ways to impact on ABET Criteria 3a-k, (also known as Engineering Criteria 2000, ABET engineering criteria, ABET 2000 Criteria or ABET Outcomes) using information literacy standards and library instruction. The driving interest here for engineering educators is assessment, that is, proving whether the ABET Criteria/Outcomes are successfully addressed in the curriculum pertaining to each engineering program at a given university. At the 2006 ASEE Conference in Chicago, ELD's Accreditation & Standards Committee plans to illustrate that engineering faculty and librarians have a common interest in information literacy components designed to address any of the "soft" or "professional" outcomes which constitute the ABET Outcomes.

In the coming year (July 06 – June 07), the committee's work could very well extend beyond standards pertaining to instruction and information literacy to standards that measure the strengths of library services across the board. Prior to the conference in Chicago, committee members will have an opportunity to express their interests for activities for the coming year. Also, a call for new members will soon go out via ELD-L.

Awards Committee

The ELD Awards Committee is pleased to announce that the 2006 Homer I. Bernhardt Distinguished Service Award will be presented to Linda R. Musser, Head of the Fletcher L. Byrom Earth and Mineral Sciences Library at the Pennsylvania State University. All nominations were incredibly strong this year. The committee cited as determining factors Linda's: inspirational, no-nonsense leadership to advance the profession; approachability, generosity, wisdom, and many other mentoring skills; prolific, extensive, significant, and practical collaborative record of scholarship including research, presentations, editorships, and publications; appointments to national and international committees or leadership teams; and last, but not least, lasting, far-reaching, and substantial contributions to ELD, other societies, the field of engineering and science librarianship, and beyond. "Linda is ... one of the people who helped establish the culture of ELD that we see today: a culture that is welcoming, knowledgeable, energetic, respectful of colleagues, and interested in the evolving mission and role of engineering librarians." Linda's nomination received a record number of support letters from ELD colleagues, former co-workers/mentees, Bernhardt honorees, and faculty from Penn State. One quote that best summarizes the views expressed in those letters and the committee's decision:

"All of these factors lead to a greater appreciation of the positive impact that Linda has had on engineering librarian-ship." Congratulations Linda!

The **2006 Best Publication Award** goes to Gül E. Okudan-Kremer, Ph.D. and Bonnie A. Osif, Ed.D. for their article "Effect of Guided Research Experience on Product Design Performance," *Journal of Engineering Education* 94, no. 2 (2005): 255-262, Available at: http://www.asee.org/about/publications/jee/PAPERS/display.cfm?pdf=848.pdf. Dr. Okudan-Kremer is an assistant professor of Engineering Design in The Harold & Inge Marcus Department of Industrial & Manufacturing Engineering at The Pennsylvania State University (Penn State). Dr. Bonnie A. Osif is the Engineering Reference and Instruction Librarian at the Engineering Library at Penn State.

The **2006 Best Reference Work Award** goes to *Information Sources in Engineering*, 4th edition, edited by Roderick A. MacLeod and Jim Corlett (Series Title: Guides to Information Sources) and published by K.G. Saur, 2005. This work updates the 1996 edition edited by Mildren and Hicks. Who are engineers and what are their information needs? What are the different categories of primary and secondary engineering information sources? What do the editors consider the main subject headings of engineering? As Randy Reichert states in his August 2005 *STLQ* review "*Information Sources in Engineering*, 4th edition, is a worthwhile edition [sic] to the reference shelves of any library whose collections and services focus on one or more engineering disciplines." Roddy MacLeod is the Senior Subject Librarian at Heriot-Watt University in Edinburgh. Jim Corlett runs a consulting company.

The Committee will formally present the awards, along with plaques for each winner, at the **ELD Annual Business Meeting in Chicago.** I would like to thank Craig Beard, Kelly Jordan, Jim Neeley. and Larry Schmidt for their outstanding work again this year.

The ELD Executive Committee has an active listserv where we discuss issues all year. Below is a summary of our activities. ELD committees have also been active and their reports also appear in this newsletter.

I asked the mentoring committee to consider adding "writing mentoring" to their list of services, or giving feedback to interested authors before they submit their papers to journals. They are working at identifying new members with editing skills and will post the details of this new service on their website. Once established, this should be an additional valuable benefit of ASEE ELD membership.

Poster sessions at each conference showcase the accomplishments of many ELD members, including new members. I asked the awards committee and PIC IV chair to consider a request for a new award, the best poster session award, to recognize their value and contributions. The number of subscribers to ELDNET-L seems to have plateaued, and at close to the all-time high number of subscribers the list had roughly 10 years ago.

For ELD-L, the number of ELD members with e-mail addresses directly determines the number of subscribers to the list. Given that a small number of retirees retain their ELD memberships but do not have e-mail addresses, and that some ASEE members who are not librarians choose to join ELD but do not want to be subscribed to ELD-L, the number of ELD-L

subscribers will always be lower than the number of total ELD members. ELD-L subscription has rebounded well from the slight dip that appeared in 2003/04, and in fact the current all-time high number of ELD-L subscribers simply reflects the current all-time high number of ELD members (244 as of 20 April 2006).

JSTOR Task Force

The JSTOR Task Force reviewed nearly 2000 engineering journal titles in order to compile a proposed list for a JSTOR Engineering Collection. The basic resource for compiling the engineering title list was the ISI JCR listings. This was supplemented by publisher data and librarian recommendations. Each journal was ranked based on its current and future digitization status, coverage in standard indexes, and JCR impact factor.

At this writing, a draft list of journal titles has been submitted to the ELD Scholarly Communications Committee for review and feedback. After the SCC provides feedback the Task Force will submit the final list to JSTOR for its review and for review by a group of librarians outside ELD.

The Mentoring Committee met for the first time at the 2005 annual conference to brainstorm ideas for pursuit by the committee. Scholarly Communication Committee

As reported in the December 2005 ELD Newsletter, the ELD Scholarly Communication Committee was formed in the fall of 2005 as a reworking and extension of the Best Practices for Electronic Resources Punch List Task Force. While the Punch List (http://eld.lib.ucdavis.edu/punchlist/unchlistRevision2005. pdf) is still an important component of what the Committee is working on, we also have activity going on in other areas as well.

One small group has organized a session for the upcoming ASEE conference featuring Charles Steele, editor of the new *Journal of Mechanics of Materials and Structures*, a not-forprofit title created to go head to head with the Elsevier journal that Prof. Steele used to edit, the *International Journal of Solids and Structures*.

A second group is continuing and extending the work of the Punch List Task Force, considering possible edits to the document, promoting it within ELD and beyond, and generally acting as a resource for anyone with questions about the document.

The third group is working on an annual review of scholarly communication actions or activities related to engineering, while the fourth has struggled to get publishers to be forthcoming with information about the copy/distribution/archival rights for their journals or other publications.

Secretary/Treasurer

ASEE's fiscal year is from October through September. I have included summaries for FY 2005 (October 1,2004 - September 30, 2005), and for the first seven months of the current fiscal year, FY 2006 (October 1,2005 – March 31, 2006).

ELD has two accounts:

- 1. *Operating Account*. The Operating Account is allocated annually by ASEE headquarters (\$500.00 for FY04 and FY05), and cannot be carried over from year.
- 2. *BASS* (Banking and Accounting Services System). The BASS account contains funds that ELD accumulates through dues, sales, contributions, etc. These funds are carried over from year to year and earn interest.

American Society for Engineering Education Southeast Section University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa April 2 - 4, 2006

Fred O'Bryant, Applied Sciences Librarian at the Charles L. Brown Science and Engineering Library at the University of Virginia, recently attended the annual conference and meeting of the American Society for Engineering Education - Southeast Section, held at the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa, April 2 - 4, 2006. The theme for the meeting was "Best Practices in Engineering Education" and for it Fred prepared and conducted a half-day workshop titled "Effective Use of Internet Resources for Teaching, Learning and Research". Keynote speaker for the meeting was David J. Nash, Rear Admiral, U. S. Navy (Retired). Admiral Nash was formerly the Director of the Iraq Program Management Office, which manages the \$18.4 billion provided by the United States in support of reconstruction of the Iraqi infrastructure. Admiral Nash gave a

very interesting and informative talk about his experiences in Iraq and the engineering and logistical difficulties involved in rebuilding that country. Among many other interesting papers presented at the meeting were ones dealing with using technological disasters to teach engineering ethics, a review of the University of Alabama's near-space BAMASAT high altitude balloon project, ways to improve students' learning through coaching and collaborative projects, understanding the differences between student and adult learners, using examples from fine art to teach science and engineering principles, and the importance of information literacy to 21st century engineers.
