This year ELD will feature a mini-plenary address by Clifford Lynch. Clifford Lynch is the director of the Coalition for Networked Information (CNI) and received the Homer Bernhardt Distinguished Service Award from ELD in 1995. This session is now split and will also include a presentation by Deborah L. Illman on Technology Journalism.

Technology Journalism:

Deborah L. Illman's research and teaching activities at the University of Washington (UW) have focused on science and engineering communication and public understanding of technology. She chaired a symposium at the 2004 meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science on "Public Engagement with Engineering," and her research on media portrayals of engineers was the cover article of the Spring 2006 issue of IEEE Technology & Society. During 2006-07, with funding from a Discovery Corps Senior Fellowship from the National Science Foundation, she is studying issues in communicating about large and long-term multidisciplinary research efforts using the NSF Science and Technology Centers as a case study. Illman is former Associate Editor of Chemical & Engineering News and is founding Editor of Northwest Science & Technology Magazine (NWS&T). Honored with ten awards including three "Best of Show" from the Society for Technical Communication, NWS&T has served as a platform for the science and technology writing curriculum she established at the UW. Illman is former Associate Director of the NSF Center for Process Analytical Chemistry (CPAC), aimed at developing new sensors for on-line monitoring and control of chemical processes. Open Computation by Clifford Lynch

As Director of the Coalition for Networked Information since July 1997. CNI, jointly sponsored by the Association of Research Libraries and EDUCAUSE, includes about 200 member organizations concerned with the use of information technology and networked information to enhance scholarship and in-

tellectual productivity. Prior to joining CNI, Lynch spent 18 years at the University of California Office of the President, the last ten as Director of Library Automation. Lynch, who holds a Ph.D. in Computer Science from the University of California, Berkeley, is an adjunct professor at Berkeley's School of Information Management and Systems. He is a past president of the American Society for Information Science and a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the National Information Standards Organization. Lynch currently serves on the National Digital Preservation Strategy Advisory Board of the Library of Congress; he was a member of the National Research Council committees that published The Digital Dilemma: Intellectual Property in the Information Infrastructure and Broadband: Bringing Home the Bits, and now serves on the NRC's committee on digital archiving.

Conference Workshop Update

Workshop 1: Session 0241: Measuring the lifelong learning outcome in terms of information literacy components. Sunday June 24th, 8am – 12 noon, Convention Center, 318B.

This workshop appeared in the February 2007 issue of ASEE Prism as session "0241 Assessment and Lifelong Learning". You will need to pre-register for the workshop, the fee is \$25. According to ASEE, it will cost you \$10 more if you register onsite.

The workshop is the most exciting piece of work from the Accreditation & Standards Committee for this year. The ELD membership responded favorably to the call for participants, producing a full slate of presenters. If you are new to information literacy or outcomes assessment, this session is a must.

This workshop is intended for engineering educators interested in learning how information literacy skills can be integrated into the curriculum for the purpose of assessing the lifelong learning outcome derived from ABET Criteria 3i. The explanation for this approach is at the curricular level, and will be useful for syllabus planning purposes. To be information literate is to possess an ability to recognize a need for information and the ability to effectively locate, evaluate, synthesize, document and communicate information. In this workshop, teams of engineering faculty and librarians from a number of institutions will 1) show how faculty can receive assistance in designing an information literacy-related assignment or activity, 2) highlight successful practices of integrating both information literacy and lifelong learn-

ing skills into the curriculum, and 3) show how a rubric or related instrument used to assess the lifelong learning outcome is created.

Purpose of workshop:

To illustrate how integrating information literacy skills into the engineering curricula can be used as one pedagogical approach to creating lifelong learners and assessing the lifelong learning outcome.

Workshop objectives:

- 1. Highlight successful practices of integrating information literacy into the engineering curriculum and courses, and explain the benefits of doing so.
- 2. Show how faculty can receive assistance in designing an information literacy-related assignment or activity.
- 3. Explain how information literacy objectives can be incorporated into course syllabi. Show how a rubric or related instrument used to assess the lifelong learning outcome is created.

Desired Outcomes:

- 1. Develop an awareness of information literacy activities for students in the classroom.
- 2. Learn how to create a rubric or related instrument used to assess the lifelong learning outcome.

"BibApp makes a splash"

Kurt F. Wendt Library staff Eric Larson and Nathan Vack presented "BibApp: Enabling rapid repository population" at the 2nd International Conference on Open Repositories, January 23-26, 2007, San Antonio, TX; the Code4Lib Conference, February 27-March 2, 2007, Athens, GA; and the Wisconsin Association of Academic Librarians Conference, April 18-21, 2007, Wisconsin Dells, WI.

BibApp has already been used to alert UW-Madison Office of Scholarly Communication and Publishing (OSCP) staff to thousands of faculty research papers that may be suitable for addition to *MINDS@UW* (http://minds.wisconsin.edu), the UW System institutional repository. That means increased exposure and permanent archiving for research produced at the UW-Madison.

Interest in this presentation and the scholarly communication work pioneered at Wendt Library for the OSCP has spread literally around the globe. The list of interested parties includes: Wake Forest University, Penn State University, Technical University of Denmark, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, University of Hong Kong, University of Calgary, Villanova University, Emory University, Kansas State University, LaTrobe University (Australia), University of Texas at Arlington, and Microsoft (a major sponsor of the Open Repositories 2007 conference).

The ELD Awards Committee is pleased to announce that the **2007 Homer I. Bernhardt Distinguished Service Award** will be presented to John M. Saylor, Director of the Engineering Library, Cornell University and Interim Associate University Librarian for Scholarly Communications and Collections, Cornell University Library. The committee cited as determining factors John's: over thirty-five years of leadership in engineering



librarianship; pioneering work in advancing the cause of digital libraries and open access initiatives; record of presentation, collaboration, and publishing; professionalism and mentoring of numerous engineering librarians; and significant contributions to ELD, including ELDnet-L, Director, and Chair of the J-STOR Task Force. "John's efforts on these projects [Synthesis and NEEDS (1990-1995), ICE (1992-1997), NDSL (2002-2006), KMODDL (2002-2004), et al.] demonstrate the forward thinking, leadership, and service that he has brought to engineering librarianship for decades." John's nomination received support from many ELD colleagues including several Bernhardt Award honorees. One final quote summarizes those letters and aided the committee's decision: "As an engineering librarian, I virtually always got more out of a session that one or more of these three people attended than if none of them was there That trio was Steve Gass, Bob Schwarzwalder, and John Saylor. I don't think it's at all coincidental that the first two of that trio has already won the Bernhardt Award." Congratulations John!

The **2007 Best Publication Award** goes to Virginia Kay Williams and Christine Lea Fletcher for their refereed article, "Materials Used by Master's Students in Engineering and Implications for Collection Development: A Citation Analysis," published in *Issues in Science & Technology Librarianship*, 45, Winter (2006). Their paper can be found at: <a href="http://www.

istl.org/06-winter/refereed1.html. Virginia (Ginger) Williams is an Assistant Professor and Assistant Collection Development Officer and Christine Fletcher is an Assistant Professor and Government Documents and Microforms Reference Librarian. Both authors work at Mitchell Memorial Library at Mississippi State University. This article is their first refereed publication.

The 2007 Best Reference Work Award goes to Using the Engineering Literature, edited by Dr. Bonnie A. Osif and published by Routledge, 2006. Bonnie is the Engineering Reference and Instruction Librarian at the Engineering Library at Penn State. This "tome" brings together, in a sub-discipline approach, those materials vital to engineering librarians and practicing engineers, regardless of format. In a review in Internet Resources Newsletter: The free, monthly newsletter for academics, students, engineers, scientists, and social scientists, 146, (2006) and found at http://www.hw.ac.uk/libwww/irn/ irn146/irn146.html#bookreview, 2006 Best Reference Work editor and ELD member Roddy MacLeod states, "A lot of work has gone into compiling this book and the result is an extremely useful reference work [for] all libraries serving engineers of any kind." Using the Engineering Literature proves to be an important, interdisciplinary guide providing engineers and researchers awareness of resources beyond their area of expertise.

The Committee will formally present these three awards at the **ELD Annual Business Meeting** in Honolulu. I would personally like to thank committee members Craig Beard, Julia Gelfand, Stephanie Hartman, Larry Schmidt, and Alice Trussell. Without their outstanding work over a short period of time, these awards would not have been chosen.

The number of subscribers to ELDNET-L has now surpassed the previous all-time high the list had in 1995/96.

For ELD-L, the number of ELD members with e-mail addresses who agree to be subbed to the list directly determines the number of subscribers to the list. Given that a small number of retirees retain their ELD memberships but do not have e-mail addresses, and that some ASEE members who are not librarians choose to join ELD but do not want to be subscribed to ELD-L, the number of ELD-L subscribers will always be lower than the number of total ELD members. ELD-L subscription has rebounded well from the slight dip that appeared in 2003/04, and in fact the current all-time high number of ELD-L subscribers simply reflects the current all-time high number of ELD members (249 as of 30 April 2007).

JSTOR TASK FORCE

During the past year, JSTOR has been in contact with many publishers regarding an engineering JSTOR collection. Progress has not been as rapid as JSTOR hoped, possibly because some publishers have not made archival digitization a priority concern and JSTOR is not well known among sci/tech publishers. JSTOR has a commitment to the project, but it may be some time before we see a product.

A round table meeting with JSTOR was held in New York City on March 16. Those attending from JSTOR were: Kimberly Lutz, Director of Public Relations; Barbara Chin, Collection Development Associate; Tanya Torres, Assistant Director for International Library Relations. The purpose of the meeting was to review the progress JSTOR has made in the project, as well as to brainstorm ways to encourage publishers to participate. Conference Report

Patent and Trademark Depository Library Program Annual Training Seminar, March 2007

Some engineering libraries are also Patent and Trademark Depository Libraries (PTDLs). Many PTDLs are located in Academic settings (45). Others are in City/County Public Libraries (31). Eight are in state libraries and one is in a special library (Linda Hall). For the third year in a row the Patent and Trademark Depository Library Program (PTDLP) Annual Training Seminar was held in the new United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO) facility in Alexandria, VA. This year's conference spanned Sunday through Friday from March 18-23, 2007. Of the 89 registrants 27 were first time attendees. A special "First Time Attendees Training" was held for them on Sunday, along with beginning/intermediate and advanced trainings on PubWest searching. PubWest is a highly robust search engine that is used by the USPTO Patent Examiners to uncover prior art related to a patent application. It can search the United States Patents back to 1920 (Using OCR Technology from 1920 to 1975), European patents and Japanese Patent Abstracts simultaneously. PubWest is now available at all patent and trademark depository libraries through online secure id access to the USPTO.

Representatives from two new PTDLs attended, one from the University of Baltimore, the other from the University of California at Riverside. Two other representatives were from libraries that are considering depository library participation, the State Library of Arizona, and the State of Connecticut Law Library. On Monday after introductions and brief reports from each PTDL librarian, USPTO sessions covered USPTO Customer Information Services and copyright. Director Ted Parr announced two key initiatives that will make assignment images available on the Web and provide full document download of patents from the Web (currently pages must be retrieved one at a time for printing). Attorney for the Office of International Relations, Susan Anthony, noted that works published in the U.S. before 1923 are in the public domain. She cited a guide from Cornell at http:// www.copyright.cornell.edu/training/Hirtle_Public_Domain.htm. Commissioner for Patents, John Doll, gave an overview of Patent Office progress and welcomed the two new depository libraries at the USPTO Director's Reception Monday after the seminar. Doll highlighted the USPTO draft strategic plan (now released in final form at http://www.uspto.gov/web/offices/com/strat2007/) and the accomplishments of the past year and stayed to engage in conversation with seminar participants.

Tuesday was Patents Day and Commissioner Doll returned to give highlights of the patent examiner program. Kris Vajs, Director of the Scientific and Technical Information Center talked about the new program for accelerated examination of patents – described at http://www.uspto.gov/web/patents/accelerated/ and the Patent Prosecution Highway fast-track examination to obtain a patent in the U.S. and Japan – described at http://www.uspto.gov/web/patents/pph/pph_index.html. Vajs also talked about patent examiner training and strategic planning initiatives and highlighted the new search templates that are available on the USPTO Web site to describe the resources that the patent examiners search for prior art for a given patent class. Check them out at

http://www.uspto.gov/web/patents/searchtemplates/ searchtemplates.htm, click on "Search Templates by Class" and look under some of the classes. You will find many familiar "non-patent literature" resources listed. Marian Knode, Director of the Technology Center gave an in-depth presentation on the process that takes a patent application to a granted patent, followed by Jim Charnley, Editorial Division, Office of Patent Classification, who gave an overview of patent classification tools. Tuesday afternoon was filled with a choice of three-hour trainings on the USPTO Website, for beginning, intermediate, or advanced searchers.

Wednesday was PTDL Association Day and opened with the PTDLA Program with presentations given by PTDL Librarians on patent displays, an online tutorial for patent searching, and non-patent literature in the patent prior-art search. These presentations are available on the web at http://www.ptdla.org/. The association's business meeting completed the morning. To celebrate the 30th anniversary of the PTDLP seminar, attendees went on a luncheon and sight-seeing cruise on the Potomac River.

Eight sessions and a choice between beginner, intermediate, or advanced Trademark Web site Trainings gave attendees ample opportunities for in depth learning on Thursday, "Trademark Day." Among the speakers were five attorneys and the Commissioner for trademarks, Lynne Beresford. Topics included a very interesting history of the trademark office, the various forms of protection offered by common law, state, and federal registration, electronic filing of trademarks and common grounds for refusing federal trademark registration. All sessions were very helpful for patent and trademark librarians, as was a session with a different approach, "How to Provide Help to Customers Without Providing Legal Advice."

USPTO Patent and Trademark Depository Library Program librarian, Tom Turner, gave a very valuable refresher on basic concepts of foreign patents in a Friday morning session. The remainder of this final day was filled with in-depth training opportunities and a choice among guided tours that included the Public Search Facility and the Scientific and Technical Information Center. Two opportunities were given to tour the Historic Patent Office that now houses the National Portrait Gallery. The tours were given by Charles Robertson who also signed his book *Temple of Invention: History of a National Landmark*.

Many PTDL representatives provide training sessions to librarians outside of their institution through local, state, and national venues.
