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# Important Schedule Change -- Reminder to Session Moderators

When contacting individuals to participate in a session, invite them to submit a paper for the proceedings as well. Individuals interested in contributing a paper to a particular session without actually making a presentation must first have the approval of the Program Chair. There is a \$20 per page charge for papers published in the proceedings, and, as headquarters states, "payment must accompany the papers before publication is possible". All papers submitted for publication are refereed.

The conference proceedings will be published on CD-ROM this year. ASEE has moved the publication deadlines forward to accommodate this change. Please review it carefully if you are planning to submit a paper.

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October 16	Program Chair contacts authors of papers to be solicited.
October 16	Abstracts of unsolicited papers are due to the Program Chair.
November 28	Papers received by the Program Chair.
November 30	Program Chair has sent papers to Publication Chair for reviewing.
December 18	Program Chair notifies authors of acceptance and of revisions.
January 8	Revised manuscripts due to Program Chair.
January 9	Publications Chair oversees review of final manuscript.
January 15	Final acceptance or rejection of papers.
February 15	Authors receive their "author kits" from ASEE.
March 15	Camera ready papers due at ASEE.

# Minutes of the 1995 Annual Business Meeting

Tuesday, June 26, 1995

 The annual business meeting of the Engineering Libraries Division was called to order by President Steve Gass at 4:40 pm. Minutes of the 1994 annual meeting were approved as printed in the September 1994 ELD Newsletter.

#### II. Committee Reports

Most committee annual reports were printed in the May 1995 ELD Newsletter. Any additions are given below.

Program Chair Bob Schwarzwalder expressed thanks to all conference participants, session leaders, and presenters.

Secretary-Treasurer Andy Stewart explained an accounting error on his part at the end of last fiscal year.

Accreditation and Standards-Karen Andrews thanked committee members Susan Herring, Kate Herzog, Deborah Kegel, Locke Morrisey, and Kate Thomes for their hard work. She requested feedback on the prototype standards database which was displayed at the ELD Poster Session. The committee needs a volunteers from each

ASEE region to make the task of soliciting survey responses easier. ASEE has published a CD-ROM which includes graduate enrollment, faculty size, and budget. K. Andrews will explore the possibility of utilizing this product to make data input faster or having ASEE include library data as part of their CD-ROM. The committee is planning to distribute the questionnaire during the 1995-96 academic year to collect 1994/95 data.

Archivist--Don Richardson reminded officers and members to send appropriate ELD-related materials such as minutes of committee meetings or important correspondence to him.

Awards--Paige Glbbs emphasized what an honor it was to present the Homer Bernhardt Award to Clifford Lynch. She noted that at the PIC IV Awards Banquet, another division presented two \$1000 awards (with corporate support) to their award recipients. Perhaps that is a worthy goal for ELD to pursue.

Membership--Glee Willis stated that her recruitment efforts have had good results. She has been proactive in contacting former/lapsed members. Any "membership problems" should be directed to Glee before inquiring with ASEE headquarters. Fred O'Bryant has joined the committee as the Editor of the ELD Membership Directory.

Newsletter Editor--Dena Thomas gave an updated expense amount for the fourth newsletter. Chair S. Gass expressed thanks to Dena's employer, the University of New Mexico, for assisting with paper and printing costs.

Publications--Torn Conkling has asked to step down as committee chair; someone with an interest in this important area is needed. One change to the printed report--a paper by S. Gass was published in the 1995 ASEE Proceedings.

Literature Guides Subcommittee--Ideas for new literature guides and volunteer compilers are always needed. The committee is seeking new members.

Union List Subcommittee--Editor Linda Musser is working on a 3rd edition. It is very close to the deadline, but NOT too late, for making appropriate submissions to Linda for it. (The original deadline was July 15.)

ELDNET Listserv Editor--Mel Desart said that about ten new subscribers have been added since the printed report was published.

ELD Chair S. Gass extended thanks to all committees for their work during the year.

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Nominating Committee--Chair Cecilia Mullen nominated Charlotte Erdmann (for Secretary-Treasurer) and Sheila Curl and Norma Godavari (for Director). The traditional practice of casting a unanimous ballot for the position of Secretary-Treasurer was initiated by Cecilia Mullen. Sheila Curl was elected Director.

### III. Old Business

A. Chair S. Gass expressed his pleasure to the membership for their overwhelming support of the ELD dues increase.

B. Generating income from ELD from the sale of the membership list was discussed again. Following a discussion which included issues of individual choice and privacy, possibly changing the division by-laws, and the fact that the whole ASEE membership list is already sold five or ten times each year anyway, it was moved and approved that the ELD Executive Committee be allowed to investigate the sale of the ELD membership list in exchange for a voluntary contribution to the ELD BASS Account. Any requests for this list which are received at ASEE Headquarters are to be routed to the division chair.

#### IV. New Business

- A. Conference Proceedings
- 1. Steve Gass asked if ELD could subsidize the page charges (\$25) of the ASEE conference proceedings. Discussion followed, including the possibilities of a maximum dollar amount per paper, one-half of the total page charges, and establishing an ad hoc committee to review this issue. The Extended Executive Committee will review this question and make a proposal at next year's meeting. Other possibilities include using either our home page or listserv as a way to distribute preprints of ELD-related papers.
- 2. We need to document ELD's peer review process to ASEE. B. Schwarzwalder will work with B. Brin to outline a process. T. Conkling will be consulted about existing procedures.
- B. A limited number of complimentary passes for division speakers are available through our PIC IV Chair. B. Schwarzwalder recommended that A. Stewart insure we get as many as possible.
- C. In advance of the PIC IV business meeting, S. Gass raised the question, "Is there a need for the PIC IV Awards Luncheon?" There are nine divisions in our PIC, representing a wide range of interests. Competition for time slots is keen, and eliminating this luncheon would free up time for more technical sessions. The basic





question is whether or not the luncheon is the best use of time and money. For ELD, it provides a larger scale of recognition and gives us good exposure across ASEE. The award could also possibly be given at the ASEE awards banquet or the ELD Dinner. We anticipate more emphasis from ASEE headquarters on the ELD Dinner in the future.

D. Paige Gibbs moved that the past chair of the Engineering Libraries Division prepare for submission to *Prism* a profile of the division, including activities, goals, and the division's relationship to ASEE. In addition, it was moved that this become recommended practice for the office of past chair. Approved.

E. A discussion about the National Engineering Information Initiative included the roles of ASEE and ELD home pages. Jim Ottaviani, David Carter, and John Saylor have been working as an ad hoc committee. David Carter is presently working as our unofficial "webmaster." ASEE Executive Director Frank Huband is very open to our division's involvement with ASEE's home page; space on the ASEE server is probably available to ELD.

Final decisions about ELD home pages and the NEII were deferred to the Extended Executive Committee.
