Beyond ELD: Librarians in ASEE Governance and Service Michael White, Queen's University, Kingston, Ont.

Although librarians have been active members of ASEE for over 100 years, their participation in ASEE governance and service opportunities outside of ELD has been limited in recent decades. No librarian has been elected to the ASEE Board since the mid-1980s. The purpose of this talk is to spark a discussion about how librarians can raise their visibility and influence within ASEE. Consulting with Research Groups to Create Project-specific Data Management Training and Protocols Megan Sapp Nelson, Purdue University

How can you use your liaison skills to assist faculty and graduate students to have better data management practices? Repurpose reference interviewing skills to identify current data management practices, perform gap analyses to identify where training might be needed, create learning objectives and assessments using your existing instructional skills, and develop activities using instructional best practices that integrate both information literacy and data information literacy.

Design Research to Gather Information on Multiple Topics Patricia Kirkwood, University of Arkansas

Over the years, I have found that my research often provides information in areas that were not intended as part of the original project. It seemed serendipitous when bibliometric research helped me provide more timely instruction topics. Or a database review would provide information about faculty productivity. Lately I have tried to design my research project to not only provide information on the primary research area, but to provides input into collection development, instruction topics, or other user services. Here are some methods I have used to keep my research both locally relevant and multifunctional. Do you have methods that you use to INTENTIONALLY double dip with your research?
