





Committee Annual Reports

Accreditation and Standards Committee

Over the course of the last year, the Accreditation and Standards Committee distributed the results of the <u>ABET Accreditation Visit Survey</u> and continued to monitor proposed ABET changes to EAC's Criterion 3 (Student Outcomes) and Criterion 5 (Curriculum). ABET approved the proposed changes in November 2017. While ELD (and the Accreditation and Standards Committee) actively sought to insert language relating to information competencies into Criterion 3, it did not happen. I do believe our active participation in the process had some impact on the language and that the engagement with other ASEE divisions on this issue was invaluable. The committee will explore any changes needed to the ELD <u>Information Competency Standards for Engineering</u> in light of the ABET EAC changes. After too many years to admit, I will be rolling off the committee and moving into the in Secretary/Treasurer position. It has been an honor serving you in this role and I certainly learned a lot, especially from my fellow committee members.

Development Committee

This has been yet another good year for the Development Committee due to our long-time sponsors and new sponsors.

The number of subscribers to ELDNET-L was, for all intents and purposes, static from last year. There are still dozens of ELD members (and thus ELD-L subscribers) who are NOT also subscribed to ELDNET-L. Why? No clue. But they're missing out on over half the engineering library-related list traffic that subscribers to both lists are receiving.

For ELD-L, the number of ELD members with e-mail addresses who agree to be subbed to the list directly determines the number of list subscribers. Given that a small number of ASEE members (who are not librarians) choose to join ELD but do not want to be subscribed to ELD-L, the number of ELD-L subscribers will always be a tiny bit lower than the total number of ELD members. The number of ELD-L subscribers is down about 5% from its all-time high of 245 in 2010/2011.



Membership Committee

As of May 1, 2018, the ELD consists of 211 members. This number is slightly higher than at the same time last year (209).

Comparing the rosters of May 2017 and May 2018, 43 members left the division while 45 different members joined. This yearly turnover rate is normal. (Between May 2016 and 2017, there was also a turnover of 43 librarians.)



By institution, ELD membership consists of 173 members representing 123 universities, 24 members representing 9 publishers, 1 corporate member, 1 member from a government institution, and 12 retired members.

Treasurer's Report

FY 2017 (October 1, 2016 - September 20, 2017)

After a couple years or so of financial disarray in the ASEE accounting department, I have positive news to report! In August of 2017, ASEE once again started distributing reconciled quarterly financial reports. The recently hired controller and accounting staff have been very helpful and responsive to my many queries these past nine months.

Background information regarding ELD accounts:

ASEE maintains the following three accounts for ELD:

BASS Account (Banking and Accounting Services System)

Operating Account (OA)

Conference Account

The BASS Account was ELD's principal account up until 2016. It earns interest that is posted quarterly. Money in this account is carried over from one fiscal year to the next, though ASEE encourages divisions to spend down their BASS Account, as its purpose is to support the mission and vision of ASEE and ELD.

Operating Account (OA) funds may be used for the same purpose as BASS Account funds, though there are some restrictions placed on OA funds. These funds needs to be spent out each year. OA fund allocations are based on membership, currently at \$1.00/member.

The Conference Account was established starting at the 2016 Annual Conference as a pass through account to pay for any conference related activities. It has become ELD's de-facto principal account since most of our business revolves around conference programming, awarding stipends for conference travel, and conference related food and drink. Establishing a Conference Account allows ELD to avoid paying the 30% fee on the significant sponsorship donations we procure since we can deposit them to this account rather than the BASS Account and spend them almost immediately. After all our conference expenses are paid, the remaining monies in the Conference Account are transferred to the BASS Account where they do incur the 30% fee.

Below are the figures for these three ELD accounts based on the financial reports received from ASEE for FY 2017.

Spotlight on Members

The ASEE ELD 2018 Homer I. Bernhardt Distinguished Service Award goes to Alice Trussell of Kansas State University in Manhattan, Kansas. As her nomination letter said, "she is an accomplished librarian and exemplary role model for current engineering librarians." Alice has served as a research librarian and liaison to science, engineering, and geology during her career, including from 2001-2015 as the Director of the Fielder Engineering Library at KSU. Alice has been an active participant in engineering librarianship within ASEE and beyond, including committee involvement with IATUL and TRAIL, while maintaining regular activity publishing and presenting. Alice has served the Engineering Libraries Division for many years in a variety of ways. She has moderated sessions from the Get Acquainted session during the time before our lightning talks format, risen to the challenge of the professional issues wrap-up session, which also had no predetermined format, and multiple technical sessions over the years. Most current ELD members will know Alice as the chair of the Awards committee, a role she held from 2007 – 2017. Now that she is not a member of the Awards committee, we can celebrate "Her dedicated work ethic, collaborative experiences, and deep level of involvement on all levels of the professional librarian's spectrum – local, state, national, international – she is an inspiration to all of us."

In this setting, we developed new materials, tools, and equipment for the oil and gas industry, including a high-bandwidth communications system capable of operating in the severe drilling environment."

David's primary interests and areas of focus during his several years of service in industry were in new product development, design for extreme conditions, and development and management of intellectual property. "Towards the latter part of my career as an engineer, I began teaching engineering funda-



latter part of my career as an engineer, I began teaching engineering fundamentals as an adjunct instructor at Utah Valley University," he says. "Late last year I determined to pursue full-time opportunities to teach and otherwise assist students at the university level, which led me back to BYU. I presently serve as the **BYU Engineering & Technology Librarian** for the University, which includes responsibilities in collection development, faculty liaison, student consultation, and research."
