Conference Program Update

Conference Update

As I write this, 19 papers submitted for presentation at the conference have gone through the draft review, and the authors are putting the finishing touches on them. Unfortunately, one of the papers was withdrawn. But we still have a great line-up. Though the technical sessions haven't been assigned to their time slots, we will have one session exploring aspects of makerspaces, one looking at marketing and outreach, two on information literacy (pedagogy and resources, respectively), and a somewhat eclectic session tentatively titled "Yesterday I Couldn't Spell Enjuneering Liberrian, and Now I Are One."

In addition to the previously mentioned panel session we're co-sponsoring on Tuesday with the Biomedical Engineering Division on open source textbooks, we have three more panel sessions on Wednesday. The topics are open engineering education research (co-sponsored by the Educational Research and Methods division and organized by Amy Van Epps), new outreach initiatives for academia (organized by Megan Stalnaker), and the impact of the ARL Pilot Library Liaison Institute Report on engineering librarianship (a library directors' panel organized by Anne Rauh).

ELD Anniversaries

Celebrating ELD's Golden and Diamond Jubilees

Many organizations celebrate important anniversaries, but few are lucky enough to have two anniversaries in the same year. The Engineering Libraries Division is one such organization. Next year, 2017, is the fiftieth anniversary of ELD becoming a division and the seventy-fifth anniversary of the creation of the Engineering School Libraries Committee (ESLC).

Librarians have been members of ASEE and its predecessor, the Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education (SPEE), since the early 1900s. However, it wasn't until the 1940s that they organized as a group.

On October 18, 1941, a dozen engineering librarians attending the fall meeting of the New England Section of SPEE at Dartmouth College formed the Engineering School Librarians Committee of New England. The main goals of the group were to improve engineering school libraries and promote closer cooperation between engineering librarians and faculty.

Librarians quickly realized that they needed a more prominent presence within SPEE. Eight months later, at the SPEE annual conference in New York in June 1942, the SPEE Council approved the creation of an Engineering School Libraries Committee (ESLC). ESLC organized programs at SPEE/ASEE meetings and recruited more members. The number of librarians in SPEE/ASEE grew rapidly in the 1940s and 50s, peaking at 57 in 1954.

Twenty-five years later, in 1967, ASEE granted division status to ESLC. This encouraged even more librarians to become members. The number of librarians in ASEE jumped from about 55 in 1965 to 159 in 1980. ELD has continued to grow and thrive over the past fifty years.

Earlier this year, ELD formed the Anniversary Planning Task Force and asked it to generate ideas for celebrating our golden and diamond jubilee year. The members are Mel DeSart, Chelsea Leachman, Amani Magid, Nestor Osorio, Zachary Painter, Anne Rauh, Tom Volkening, Michael White, and Yu Zhang. The group has been busy brainstorming ideas. We also encourage all ELD members to share their ideas via our online survey (available at <https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/DWQZCZW>) or by contacting any member of the task force.

The task force's first success was the creation of a long-term member recognition certificate program, which will be administered by the Membership Committee. ELD members who have been members for at least ten years are eligible to receive a certificate. Certificates for membership anniversaries in five-year intervals (10, 15, 20, 25, and so on) will be presented annually. More details about the program will be posted on the ELD website and in future newsletters.

On behalf of the task force, thanks to those ELD members who have contributed ideas. Please keep them coming. We look forward to kicking off the celebrations with you in New Orleans.

Accreditation and Standards Committee

ABET continues to work through its process for revising its accreditation criteria for engineering programs. They are currently focusing on Criterion 3 (Student Outcomes) and Criterion 5 (Curriculum). ABET has drafted several possible changes to the learning outcomes that accredited engineering degree programs would produce in students.

One part of the current draft revision would replace an outcome related to lifelong learning with students attaining, "An ability to recognize the ongoing need for additional knowledge and locate, evaluate, integrate, and apply this knowledge appropriately."

This revision could create additional opportunities for engineering libraries to be part of the education of future engineers.

As ABET's process progresses, the A&S committee is working to stay involved. One committee member attended a forum on the proposed revisions, and a couple others attended the forum virtually. A few committee members were involved in the ASEE interdivisional virtual town hall on the proposed revisions to the ABET criteria.

At the ASEE conference in late June, there will be at least one town hall about the proposed revised criteria. Please attend if you can, but please also consider commenting now, while there's still plenty of time before the final deadline.

The latest draft proposed criteria are posted at the ABET site, and their comment survey is open until the end of June.

After that deadline, ABET's revision committee will consult with the ABET leadership to decide how to proceed - go through another draft, leave the criteria as they were, adopt the new criteria, etc. Comments from all of the stakeholders, including us, are important. Please comment to ABET and participate in the town hall.

Mentoring Committee

Hello ELD Membership:

The ELD Mentoring Committee is piloting an e-forum on topics of interest to engineering librarians in late August / early September 2016. The ELD e-forum is a moderated, online discussion, and will run for 4-6 hours on two consecutive days. The e-forum is very similar to the e-forum program offered by RUSA's Reference Services Section, which uses email instead of a webinar software. The individuals volunteering to moderate will select the topics and draft a series of questions to stimulate and guide the discussion. The expertise of the moderator and that of the participants creates the conversation. Quite a lot of email is generated. The questions will be summarized at the end of the forum.

Given that we are looking at August or September, we will have time to gather input at the ASEE Conference in New Orleans, but we'd like to put out a call for moderators in April, along with a list of topics and guidelines for participants. The call might read along these lines:

DRAFT CALL

Dear colleagues,

The ELD Mentoring Committee is seeking volunteers to moderate the discussion for our upcoming fall e-forum on one of the following topics, or topic of your choice! [Provide list of topics]

Moderator duties include:

- Being present for a 2 day email discussion on a specific topic (or a shorter period of availability if more than one moderator is active)
- Developing a list of questions on the topic to stimulate discussion
- Guiding discussion and responding to queries
- Providing a brief summary at the end of the discussion on day one
- Provide a final summary of the e-forum for posting on the ELD website

Once the moderator(s) are selected and the topic confirmed, an announcement goes out to membership, along with a link to register to participate in the e-forum. The registration site could be in SurveyMonkey. See sample here:

The individual hosting registration collects the email addresses and creates a list to be submitted to the moderator(s). The day before the forum, the moderator sends an email to all, using the bcc line. This email reminds people of the forum dates/times and spells out a few "best practices", such as 1) Always "Reply All" 2) Eliminate duplicative Re: Re: in the subject line prior to sending your email 3) If you are changing the subject or asking a new question, modify the subject line appropriately 4) It is easiest to set up a folder for all the ELD_EF mail to go. This way you can catch up on the conversation by accessing this one folder.

At the end of day one, the moderator sends out a summary email to registrants and reminds them of the times for the next day's forum. At end of the second day, the moderator writes up a full summary and emails it to registrants and possibly posts it on the ELD website.
