Before jumping into what has been happening since the conference in Louisville, I wanted to thank one more time all of the attendees and contributors for making the ELD sessions in Louisville so successful. Despite competing with another big conference for the second straight year and losing some attendees due to travel budget cuts, we again had a respectable turnout of the ELD membership. The session evaluations from Louisville were universally positive and the Lightning Talks experiment for the Get Acquainted Session was very well received. Overall, all sessions were again rated between "Good (4)" and "Excellent (5)." There was, of course, also constructive criticism received and passed on to this year's Program Chair and Program Planning Committee. There is always room for improvement and the evaluations are definitely being taken into account for this year's planning.

While I am in the thanking mode, thanks again to the moderators, the Mentoring Committee, the Publications Committee, the Development Committee, the Directors, and the Program Planning Committee for taking on some so much of the conference workload...the conference would not have come off without you. From the call that has gone out to ELD-L and from the entry from this year's Program Chair in this newsletter, you can see that planning is already well underway. As always, the range of proposed workshops and sessions are both timely and relevant to what we do as Engineering Librarians. I hope we again fill our session slots to capacity with the usual high caliber programming to which we have grown accustomed. On a program planning note, SmoothPaper has been retired and been replaced by Monolith. Monolith promises

to be an improvement over the old system, but everybody is learning the system at the same time, so please have patience and understanding as we figure out how best to make the new system work for us.

Over the summer, I was approached by other PIC III and PIC IV division chairs (see <http://depts.washington.edu/englib/eld/ELDfaq.php#picIV> for a brief explanation of the PIC structure) about a possible reorganization of ASEE PICs and inter-divisional collaboration. An online conversation on these topics was held between July 28th and August 5th, 2010. Twenty-three individuals representing 16 divisions participated in the conversation that wound up being fairly broad reaching with the most emphasis being placed more on better cooperation between divisions. A potential “town-hall” style session is being proposed by the Liberal Education Division for the Vancouver and I have volunteered, with consultation with our Extended Executive Committee, to co-sponsor the session should it come to fruition. Anybody interested in reading the summary of the discussion can contact me directly for a copy.

Our outgoing PIC IV chair, Noel Schulz, mentioned at the ELD Business Meeting in Louisville that ASEE was forming an ASEE Plagiarism Task Force to be chaired by Walt Buchanan from Texas A&M. A general call went out via ELD-L and while not everybody who volunteered from ELD was added to the Task Force, I am happy to report that three of our own were added: Amy Buhler, Haymwantee Singh, and Pauline Melgoza. Congratulations and thanks for volunteering your time and effort to this Task Force! Not only is plagiarism a subject of importance to us as a Division, but this kind of volunteering for committees and task forces across divisions really helps promote our role and presence in the Society as a whole.

At this year’s Extended Executive Board meeting, the ELD Accreditation and Standards Committee suggested that ELD have a representative to the STS Information Literacy Taskforce that is in the process of updating its *Information Literacy Standards for Science and Engineering & Technology*. In consultation with the Executive Committee, I was very happy to appoint Megan Sapp-Nelson as ELD Liaison to the Task Force. It certainly is important to have ELD’s perspective represented on this Task Force and given Megan’s background and interest in both IL and ABET Accreditation, she is an ideal fit for this position. I look forward to hearing how the Task Force progresses.

The ELD Sustainability Task Force presented their report at the Business Meeting in Louisville. As requested in their charge, the Task Force researched and drafted the “Sustainable Business Practices Guidelines for ELD” for potential adoption by ELD. The draft guidelines have been posted on the ELD Wiki at http://eldwiki.lib.ucdavis.edu/index.php/SUSTAINABLE_BUSINESS_PRACTICES_GUIDELINES_FOR_ELD

The task force also made three additional recommendations:

- Promote the guidelines, including encouraging members to share sustainable ideas and resources on the ELD wiki at ‘Examples of Sustainable Practices’ (http://eldwiki.lib.ucdavis.edu/index.php/EXAMPLES_OF_SUSTAINABLE_PRACTICES) to ELD membership via the listserv, newsletter and other venues;
- Use the guidelines as mechanism to lobby adoption of sustainable practices by ASEE as a whole; and
- Create a new task force or committee to specifically investigate methods for virtual participation in the annual conference.

The Executive Committee discussed and accepted the recommendations of the TF and is currently in the process of implementing the recommendations. With this newsletter entry I would formally like to encourage ELD members to actively participate in building on the work that TF has so ably started. I will share the TF report and recommendations with our new PIC IV chair, Bev Watford, and encourage her to share it with other PIC chairs in an effort to promote this important issue more broadly in ASEE. Be on the lookout via ELD-L for a call for volunteers to take on the third recommendation for increasing virtual participation.

Once again, I am really looking forward to Vancouver and I hope to see as many of you as possible at the meeting. I cannot think of too many other North American cities as beautiful, vibrant, and exciting as Vancouver, and no, I do not work for Tourism Vancouver. Mix in an ASEE conference, ELD colleagues and sessions, and I think we will have a conference we will not soon forget. Until we see each other again next June, I would like to wish everyone a great start to the school year and a productive and rewarding academic year!

First Canadian Engineering Education Association Conference

Michael White gave a brief report on the inaugural Canadian Engineering Education Association (CEEA) Conference, which was held at Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario, June 7-9. Approximately 120 engineering faculty and librarians from universities across Canada attended. Ninety two papers were presented, including several by librarians. The 2011 meeting will take place at Memorial University in St. John's, Newfoundland. CEEA is in the process of drafting bylaws and incorporating as a non-profit organization.

Awards Presentations

Craig Beard (presenter) and Patricia Kirkwood announced the 2010 awards. Craig and Patricia thanked the other members of the Awards Committee: Alethea Greenwood, Alice Trussell, Stephanie Hartman and Julia Gelfand.

The Best Publication Award goes to Meghan Lafferty of the University of Minnesota for her article, "A Framework for Evaluating Science and Technology Electronic Reference Books: A Comparison of Five Platforms in Chemistry," published in the Fall 2009 issue of *Issues in Science and Technology Libraries*.

The ELD Homer Bernhardt Award was awarded to Jay Bhatt of Drexel University. Jay is the "Energizer Bunny" of ELD. He has been a very active and productive member since 1998 and has made a number of important contributions to the division. He served as treasurer/secretary in 2005, program chair for the 2007 conference in Honolulu and chair in 2007. He is an outstanding mentor and colleague. Jay expressed his deep gratification and thanks.

Best Poster Award

John Teleha reminded everyone that the Best Poster Award will be announced tomorrow.

Professional Issues Forum

Mel DeSart reminded everyone that there is no set format for the Professional Issues Forum on Wednesday. Members should let him know what issues they wish to discuss.

AGENDA

Meeting called to order at 4:30 by Bob Heyer-Gray

New EEC Members (5 minutes)

New members Jill Dixon, Larry Thompson (returning), Dave Schmitt and Stephanie Hartmann (both in absentia) were welcomed.

Mel will update the EEC mailing list.

Conference Review (15 minutes)

- Few tears will be shed over the demise of Smoothpaper after this year's fiasco during the paper submission process. Its successor, Monolith, is looked upon with both hope and trepidation as to whether it will prove to be a better system.
- Sessions for the most part went very well.
- Catering was very good with the exception of the two Tuesday morning sponsored breakfasts held in the same room for two different sessions. The second round never arrived. Steve Stich (Development Chair) ably complained to the management and secured a \$700 refund for his trouble.
- Room size was generally not an issue for most sessions. It came to light that ASEE uses session evaluation forms as de facto head counts to help determine room assignments for the next annual conference, so their submission was highly encouraged after each session
- Much positive feedback was received regarding this year's format of the Getting Acquainted session with "Lightning Talks". Members felt it less chaotic than in years past. The Mentoring Committee would like to do more to acknowledge and welcome new members. It was also noted that having lunch accessible a half hour before the start of the meeting was a very good thing.
- The suggestion of using Skype during sessions for the benefit of remote members was brought up. Internet access and cost were mentioned a potential hindrances for pursuing this. It was also noted that Christine Drew had been continuing her role in documenting the conference via the ELD Conference Blog for the benefit of the Division.
- Another observation was raised that ELD paper reviewers should be informed whether the papers they are receiving are to be intended as posters or presentations. It was note that this would help provide useful perspective for how they should review the material.

Operating Account/Updated distribution of funds to divisions (5 minutes)

- For the next two years, division operating accounts will receive \$1.00 per division member as base funding with the disbursement process to be reviewed at the end of that time. This will result in ELD losing roughly half of its normal funding in this account. The rules for using these funds have been relaxed however, and may be used more in line with how BASS accounts operate.
- It was suggested that ASEE be encouraged to change their disbursement algorithm by having members declare primary and secondary affiliations and distributing funds based on that.

Duplicates Exchange (5 minutes)

- Linda Yamamoto from Stanford has agreed to take over the management of the Duplicates Exchange from Orion Pozo (NC State). Orion steps down after monitoring the Duplicates Exchange for 18 years. After this coming year, the service will be reevaluated to determine if interest exists to continue.

ELD Anniversaries in 2012 & 2017 – Should We Celebrate? (5 minutes)

- These were viewed as potential marketing opportunities to the rest of ASEE.
- General opinion was that little more than a cake at possibly the Banquet should be done for the 45th and more effort given to celebrating the 50th. A task force to begin planning was not assigned at this time.

ELD Membership Directory “Experts List by Expertise” (5 minutes) – Lisha Li

- Due to the frequent updating required to maintain it, the list will be discontinued in the directory. More reliance will be placed on the *ELD wiki* for finding experts within the division as well as extending new invitations via Facebook and LinkedIn.

Brief overview of the Development Program (5 minutes) – Stephen Stich

- The Development Committee came about to develop formal relationships with sponsors. It has eased some of the work for the Program Chair and has benefited the membership with an increased number of catered events at each conference since its inception.
- Larry Thompson will be assuming the committee chair role as Stephen Stich has stepped down.
- The committee has been working directly with event caterers rather than through ASEE, which has some risks, but has mostly been to our advantage, particularly in supplemental event costs.
- We’re finding that sponsor contacts are rotating faster than committee members, which has made is a bit more of a challenge to sustain relationships.
- Discussion ensued on how to recognize our sponsors further with a full page ad in the ELD newsletter. It was also suggested that a brochure be created to inform a potential sponsor why they might consider doing so.
- It was suggested that only a lump sum amount of sponsor contributions be reported in the Treasurer’s report as a matter of course.
- Should further funding become available, other ways of spending were suggested such as funding internet access during sessions or perhaps subsidizing new members travel funds so they may attend the conference.

Information Literacy: Survey Results and Recommendations Information literacy and ABET statement (15 minutes) – Sheila Young

- Sheila reported that she received 63 responses to her survey with 91% recommending ELD endorsement of the ACRL/ STS Information Literacy Standards for Science and Technology either with or without some addenda. The Executive Committee will take that under advisement and determine whether to issue such an endorsement.
- It was recommended that a formal ELD liaison to STS should be in place to provide a voice for further revisions to the standards.
- It was suggested that a reinvigorated task force be created to maintain the ELD Information Literacy wiki.
- Sheila also reported attending a session on ABET discussing revision of Criterion III. She spoke with the ABET accreditation director after the session and received a favorable response to considering ELD participation in the revision process. She will revise the ELD ABET Committee’s document on ELD participation along with creating an executive summary to submit to ABET with ELD Executive Committee approval.

Planning for 2010 in Vancouver, BC (30 minutes) – Mike White

- Mike has already received quite a few ideas for sessions, examples:
 - Projects Gone Wrong
 - Visualization tools
 - Ethics, particularly on cheating with technology
 - Open Access Debate
 - E-Science, perhaps a Sunday workshop on practical Data Curation
 - Collaborative outreach
 - Patron Driven Collection Development
- Planning Committee to be named.
- Mike plans to set up a program chair blog
- Issues in particular to stay on top of:
 - the ongoing Monolith implementation
 - border crossing information for members and local information
 - session room assignments and costs, particularly for onsite catering, from ASEE
 - knowing conference center room capacities for lunches to determine whether they can be held there or in a hotel.
 - other costs and exchange rate.

Highlights of the Discussion

1. Major categories on mentoring wiki. Karen Andrews will add them.
2. ELD members will populate and add content in various categories in wiki. Others can edit and refine.
3. Capture challenging questions and summaries from listserv. We can add a category pertaining to this on our wiki.
4. Introduce new members during Get Acquainted and/or new member reception. Mentoring committee members, mentors, new members and conference buddies stand up during the Get Acquainted session.
5. Use listserv to seek and research collaborators. Any ELD members needing to find a collaborator for a project can post a message on the ELD listserv to initiate conversation with a member to develop collaborative opportunities.

Abstract:

The Space Department at the Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Laboratory (APL) launched a formal mentoring program in 2007. While a mentoring program existed previously, it was not widely utilized and eventually lost support. The new program was designed to focus on the staff members' needs and desires for career growth and an opportunity for those skilled with years of expertise in the space domain to share their wisdom and gain a new perspective. Especially in an era where budgets are constrained, mentoring is a cost effective method to ensure continuity of knowledge and enthusiasm in staff. This discusses the motivations for starting the program, the hurdles involved, and the benefits derived during the first few years of APL's new Space Department mentoring program. This includes the design details of the program, as well as successes and lessons learned to date.

Greening the Gordon Library

Christine Drew, Worcester Polytechnic Institute

Last fall a first year Great Problems Seminars team consisting of Jian Mao, Ryan Mocadlo, Ryan Shooshan, and Lauren Waring completed a project on "Gordon Library Energy Efficiency." Students focused on insulation of windows and walls, energy use by library technology, and the feasibility of a rooftop photovoltaic system. An engineering masters' student, Jamie Meyer, completed a theses that may help the Gordon Library staff realize our vision of greening our library with rooftop solar panels. Jamie's project "Design of a Rooftop Photovoltaic Array for the George C. Gordon Library at Worcester Polytechnic Institute: Structural, Thermal, and Performance Analysis" was completed this past spring. In addition the library provides recycling options throughout, replaced bottle spring water with filtered, made recent improvements to our drafty windows, and the staff compost our coffee grounds and food scraps.
