ASEE called us out, requiring all Divisions to "Publish to Present." I am proud to say that ELD folks did not back down! We came out with six-guns a-blazing with 29 abstracts submitted by 27 primary authors! (And that number rises to 43 when you add on the co-authors!) All the authors are aware of the publication requirements and have until February 6, 2009 to submit a draft paper. They have also been reminded to take advantage of the Mentor Committee's Paper Review Service. Just contact Karen Andrews and her folks will assist with editorial needs.

ASEE made it clear that the corral in Austin is much smaller than what we had in Pittsburgh. Program Chairs were told not to expect as many session requests to be accepted. Last year, Amy requested (and had accepted) seven technical sessions, four business sessions, two social events, the poster session, two workshops, and a Distinguished Lecturer for a total of 17 sessions – an amazing achievement! This year, I submitted requests for 14 sessions and all were accepted. In addition, I was asked to co-sponsor a workshop with ERM. These sessions include: seven technical sessions, three business sessions, two social events, the poster session, and two workshops. Through a combination of fewer session requests **AND** the membership submitting a large number of abstracts, we were able to maintain our full herd of technical sessions! From the ten suggested topics, six attracted abstracts and a seventh fell into place. The draft titles of our sessions include: ***From the New Librarian's View; Web 2.0/Library 2.0 Use and Misuse in Engineering Libraries; Information Literacy; Collections and Space Planning; Data / Digitization Projects; Collaboration;*** and ***Technical Papers.***

Our Directors, Nancy Linden and Linda Whang, are hard at work organizing the ***New Member's Welcome Reception*** and the ***Annual Banquet***, respectively. Our three business sessions include the Monday ***Special Interest Groups / Get Acquainted*** session, the Tuesday ***Annual Business Meeting*** (over lunch like last year), and the ***Extended Executive Committee Meeting*** at 4:30 pm on Wednesday. The business session not requested was the ***ELD Committee Meetings***. When you see the schedule, you will see how packed it is. The Committee Meetings

session would have had to have been scheduled for 7:00 am. I trust that Committee Chairs can coordinate times when their groups can meet. One suggested time is Monday from 4:30-6:00 pm during the **NSF Poster Session**.

Our first workshop is entitled **Three Rules for Great Presentations**. Lee Andrew Hilyer, from the University of Houston Libraries, plans to “combine the best evidence on multimedia learning with real-world practical guidelines and cover three simple rules for ensuring effective, learner-centered presentations.” The workshop will be onsite from 2-5:00 pm on Sunday, June 14, 2009. The second workshop’s working title is **How to Improve Teaching and Learning: Selecting and Integrated Digital Learning Materials**. Dr. Joseph Tront, from Virginia Tech, “focuses on the 10,000 educational resources cataloged in the **Engineering Pathway** digital library (www.engineeringpathway.org) and the resources and tools available for faculty to use to locate, evaluate and select helpful digital learning materials to achieve their teaching and learning goals.” This will be an onsite workshop from 9 am to Noon on Sunday, June 14, 2009.

One major change to the program this year is that ASEE will have two **Main Plenary** sessions: the usual at 8:30 am on Monday and then again at 8:30 am on Tuesday. This means that the **Distinguished Lecturers** will only be on Wednesday morning after the **ASEE Division Poster Session**. Another change involves ASEE retiring the **Emerging Trends Poster Session** on Monday afternoon and replacing it with the **NSF Poster Session**.

I want to extend my sincere thanks to everyone who has helped with the planning so far. Now that the first phase of the planning is over, many ELD members will become involved in the second phase: the Programming Committee and Development Committee will be rounding up the stray details and horse-trading with our sponsors; the Mentoring Committee may seek a posse to help our authors prepare high quality papers; and the Publications Committee will have its hands full wrangling and reviewing twenty-nine papers. All these folks will be hard at work, helping to make sure that your Austin experience will be rewarding and stimulating, whether you are new to ELD or an experienced engineering librarian.

So, mark your calendars for June 14-17, 2009. Remember to plan on the Sunday workshops and the Extended Executive Committee Meeting if those two are to be part of your Austin experience. If you arrive early or leave late, look for the CUEBALLS events scheduled for Saturday night, Sunday, and/or Wednesday evening!

Awards Committee "Call for Nominations"

The ELD Awards Committee is seeking nominations for three annual awards. (The fourth award - Best Poster - is decided at the Annual Conference and Exposition in June, 2009.) Nominations are an essential part of the awards process. The committee welcomes input from engineering librarians and other colleagues.

Ask yourself the following:

- Did you write an engineering information related paper/book in 2008?
- Have you read an excellent engineering information related paper/book written in 2008?
- Have you purchased or reviewed a significant engineering information related reference work written in 2007 or 2008?

Do you know someone who deserves to be recognized for his or her "Distinguished Service" to ELD and/or engineering information?

If you answered "Yes!" to any of these questions, please take the time and effort to nominate each item you said "Yes!" too. Please feel free to nominate more than one worthy candidate. Nominations and opinions regarding reference works are particularly sought by the committee since none of us owns everything published!

Please take note of the February deadlines. Prior to 2005, the committee began their work after nominations were received at the end of March. The change to the middle of February reflects the need to have the committee finish its work on these three Awards before March 15th.

1. HOMER I. BERNHARDT DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD - Each year at the ASEE Annual Conference, the Engineering Libraries Division presents an award, consisting of a plaque that recognizes work that contributes to the advancement and development of excellence in engineering libraries. Membership in ASEE is not a requirement for this award.

Award nominations must include the name, title, and contact information of the nominee and nominator, nomination rationale statement, and curriculum vitae of the nominee. The rationale statement should not exceed 700 words and should clearly indicate why the candidate is being nominated for this award. Letters of support from individuals besides the person making the nomination may be included.

2. BEST PUBLICATION AWARD - The purpose of this award is to honor the best new paper or non-reference monographic work in engineering information published during the year 2008.

Criteria:

1. Single or multiple authors are eligible. Works authored by Awards Committee members are ineligible during the members' term of service.
2. Work must have been published during the year prior to the year in which the award will be made.
3. Work should represent a significant contribution to the field of engineering information. Work should be scholarly, show evidence of thorough research, documentation, and critical evaluation. It should be clearly written and well organized.



Deadline for Nomination: February 5, 2009

3. BEST REFERENCE WORK AWARD - The purpose of this award is to honor the best new reference work in engineering information.

Criteria:

1. Single or multiple authors are eligible. Works authored by Awards Committee members are ineligible during the members' term of service.
2. Reference works must have been published/released during the previous two years prior to the year in which the award will be made.
3. Reference works should represent a significant contribution to the field of engineering information.
4. Works in all media are eligible.

Deadline for Nomination: February 5, 2009

Remember! Your participation in the nomination process is essential to keeping the Awards a vital part of ELD. Without your nominations, we run the risk of missing the "Best of the Best!"
