REGISTRATION FEE SURVEY RESULTS REPORT

We received a total of 63 responses representing approximately 30% of the ELD members. While the response rate was positive, we hoped to see a higher rate, given the importance of this topic to our division. Interestingly, 49% are newer ELD members with less than five years of membership. These numbers demonstrate the newer members' strong interest in engaging with the division and give us hope for a strong and secure ELD future.




Figure 1. Professional Organizations Memberships of ELD Members

Members were asked to report memberships to professional organizations to identify where ELD members might be allocating funds for either memberships or conferences. The results are shown in Figure 1. Given that most of the responses came from newer ELD members, it is interesting to see that the SLA membership at only six responses. The Other category was mainly related to discipline-specific organizations such as the American Chemical Society.




Figure 2. Professional Conferences Regularly Attended by ELD Members

We asked members to report which conferences they regularly attended to gauge engagement with other professional organizations. In the Other category, conferences such as the Charleston Conference, TRAIL, STELLA, Bootcamps, and IFLA were mentioned. The results are shown below in Figure 2.

From the reasons for NOT attending a conference, the cost is ranked first, and the institutional funding available is ranked 2nd, while distance, location, and theme were ranked last. ASEE Conference is perceived as the most valuable conference, with ACRL ranked in the second position, ALA ranked third, and SLA conference ranked fourth.

Although 77% reported that professional development activities are required at their institutions, many do not receive much financial support. Thirteen percent receive institutional funding over \$2,001, with most receiving less than the \$2,000 mark - 33% receive \$1,001-\$2,000, and 19% receive only \$501-\$1,000. Eighty-eight percent of participants reported that they do not have grants for professional travel and that they used their own money to attend professional conferences. A total of 65% of participants have used their own money to attend the ASEE conferences as well as other conferences - 25% to attend ACRL, 12 (19%) to attend library state conferences, and 22% used their own funds to attend several other conferences. Forty-six percent of survey participants spent up to \$500 to attend conferences, while 25% spent up to \$1000 to attend conferences of interest.

The insufficient travel funds resulted in not being able to attend one or more conferences - 55.5% have missed attending the ASEE conferences, 42% missed attending ACRL, 25% missed attending ALA, and 16% missed attending SLA. The high registration fee for the ASEE conference was listed as the top reason for missing attending the ASEE conference:

"It got more difficult to convince the admin that this is a critical conference for an engineering librarian, and I have to choose between going to ASEE and other conferences."

"... ASEE is more expensive...other travel funds are awarded first, and sometimes none are left for me."

"Unless I'm presenting, I don't even request approval to attend ASEE-ELD anymore because of the costs. If registration were much lower, I might consider asking for funding and/or self-fund to attend."

"As a librarian covering multiple disciplines, I'd love to attend ASEE but I have to also attend other confs. ASEE's price makes it the least affordable though it is probably one of the more useful/educational."

"My department chair often used the ASEE registration cost as an example of one of the most expensive conference registration costs she had to fund. And she compared it with other conference registration fees. The overall costs, including hotels and transportation, are about the same, but the registration fee is far higher than any other professional conference."

"I often have to choose between ELD and another major conference."

"ACRL is bi-yearly (odd years), so in those years I typically have to choose either ASEE or ACRL because I can't get funding for both. [...] The cost of the ASEE conference has reached the point that I can't justify it to my department head."

"I have never been able to attend ASEE in person. I once received an ELD stipend that made it possible to attend, but it was virtual. I would very much like to attend ASEE each year, or even just occasionally. But the current cost of registration is prohibitive."

"I no longer attend ASEE due to the cost, although the conferences were valuable to me professionally. Instead, I participate in other conferences that are relevant to my work but less expensive. I regret not being able to attend ASEE."

Survey participants also responded overwhelmingly positively when asked if having an ELD reduced registration rate would impact conference attendance. Participants cited that it would be more affordable and acknowledged the lack or reduced travel funds available for librarians compared to faculty.

To gather feedback regarding ELD as a division, we asked, "Can you share how your ELD membership has or has not benefited you?" Here is a selection of responses:

"ELD is my professional family! Everything at the conference is relevant to me and I learn a lot, I made friends, I found collaborators, and I trust I can get professional help anytime I needed."


"Keeping up with current trends in engineering librarianship and networking."

"Opportunities to publish, opportunities to grow my professional network, and opportunities for service to the profession."

"Being a new librarian and new to STEM, ELD membership has proved extremely beneficial to meeting colleagues, learning about the field, and growing professionally."

"I've learned a lot from the webinars held so far and have joined a committee. I'd like to attend a conference in the future."

Hello, ELD!

Planning for the 2023 Annual ASEE Conference - The Harbor of Engineering Education for 130 Years - has begun! We hope to see everyone in Baltimore, Maryland, June 25-28, 2023.

Abstract submission was still open as of this newsletter submission, but the proposals so far indicate we'll have an exciting program. Thanks to everyone who submitted abstracts and special session proposals! Our program planning committee will be hard at work putting together a mix of sessions that include lightning talks, panels, papers and posters, and, of course, our ELD social events. Abstract submissions are now closed.

ASEE has made some updates for the 2023 conference based on member feedback. Some changes include no technical or business sessions on Sunday, and Sunday workshops will be held from 1:00 - 3:30 p.m. to allow time for attendees to travel on Sunday morning instead of Saturday. The Exhibit Hall will open on Sunday afternoon and will be open for all days of the Conference. Poster presenters will be able to have their posters on display throughout the Conference, beginning Sunday, along with the usual specified blocks for poster presentations (e.g., NSF Grantees, Student Posters, etc.). Lastly, the "free time" breaks on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday have been extended to one hour.

IN MEMORY OF TOM VOLKENING

Thomas Charles Volkening - 1950-2022







Tom Volkening got his first librarian job, at the University of Detroit, in 1977 (yes, 45 years ago). From the very start he was involved with engineering, having subject responsibility for chemical, electrical, and mechanical engineering, as well as other subject areas, in that first position. In 1984 he became the Engineering Librarian at Michigan State University and held that position until his retirement in the summer of 2022. Tom joined ASEE and ELD in 1985 and had the fourth longest active continuing membership in ELD at the time of his passing. Tom was active in ELD over the entirety of his years as a member, serving on multiple committees, task forces, working groups, etc., from 1995 until his retirement earlier this year. Tom had a few specific professional interests, including mentoring younger librarians, scholarly communication, and accreditation (Tom arguably had more ABET accreditation experience than any other current ELD member). He was awarded the Homer I. Bernhardt Distinguished Service Award by ELD in 2021, only a year after receiving the librarian career achievement award from his colleagues at Michigan State.

But Tom's interests were much broader than his library work. He was a gardener extraordinaire – most of his professional publications had to do with fruits and vegetables, seeds, and other food-related topics than with anything engineering/library related. He was an avid sightseer, often taking days before or after an ASEE conference to explore in and around the city that hosted the conference each year. He regularly took nature drives and was an excellent amateur nature photographer, posting many of his photographs to Facebook for others to enjoy. His photography interests also extended to family, with many postings to Facebook of interesting old family photos.



PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE UPDATE

The Mentoring Committee was renamed during the summer to the Professional Development Committee with a change in scope to reflect a greater emphasis on creating webinar sessions on topics of interest to engineering librarians. The following is a brief synopsis of the 2022 webinars coordinated by the Professional Development Committee, and an announcement for Spring 2023.

<u>ELD Committees Introduction Webinar</u> March 30, 2022. This webinar featured the chairs of 10 committees within ELD, each giving an overview of the scope of their work and recent activities.

Open Forum for Early Career Librarians, 2022 ASEE Conference Workshop, Minneapolis, June 28, 2022. Early career librarians (0-5 years' experience) posed their questions and those with more experience responded.

Fall 2022 semester webinars

Early Career Librarians Workshop, 61 Registered & 48 Attended. August 11, 2022. Early Career Librarians (0-5 years experience) posed their questions and those with more experience responded to the questions. This was a repeat for those not able to attend the in-person Open Forum for Early Career Librarians, 2022 ASEE Conference workshop, Minneapolis, June 28, 2022.

<u>ELD Scholarly Communications Cool Tools</u>, 59 registered & 32 attended. September 23, 2022. The webinar included the following: ELD Open Access Statement, ELD Google Scholar Profile, Best Practices for increasing the visibility of an individual document, Engineering and Applied Sciences Society Open Access Policies Resource, and Open Textbooks in Engineering.

<u>ELD Technical Standards</u>, 198 Registered & 142 Attended. November 10, 2022. The session included these areas: definition, types and uses, standardization process, accreditation requirements & employer expectations, curriculum integration, and collection development. The presenters are writing a book on the topic and expect that it will be published next year. In addition to being a great topic, the large number of attendees, 142, can be explained partly as this session was marketed to a wider audience going on both the members list (ELD-L) and open listserv (ELDnet) Some comments from the survey:

"Great balance of panelists and coverage of technical standards (types and usage, curriculum integration, collection development)"

"I really appreciated the slide on curriculum types, as it provided a bit of insight into the crossover of activities of different types of instruction."

Summary of Fall 2022 semester webinars and feedback

Professional Development Committee members gave enthusiastic comments on the participant feedback from surveys. Overall, with this programming being new to our committee, these attendance numbers are very strong with over 222 attendees. The survey responses for the three events from the fall semester show that overall, most

respondents gave highly positive ratings for quality/usefulness and that a large percentage of responses were from early career librarians 0 to 5 years' experience). Based on strong attendance and feedback, this committee plans to continue offering relevant programming.

PSU LIBRARIES IMLS GRANT

The <u>Penn State University Libraries</u> received an <u>Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS)</u> grant from the <u>Pennsylvania Department of Education</u> to purchase international and industry standards in support of diversity, equity, inclusion and accessibility (DEIA) in core Pennsylvania industries. These items are now available for loan to Pennsylvania residents and businesses.

"The purpose of this project was to increase access to and awareness of industry and international standards for the benefit of Pennsylvania businesses and entrepreneurs," said Linda Musser, Distinguished Librarian and head of the <u>Fletcher L. Byrom Earth and Mineral Sciences Library</u>, who spearheaded the project. "Standards developed by experts are consensus publications that document best practices. In a global economy, use of international standards is increasingly required to do business. However, standards are expensive, and few Pennsylvania libraries collect or acquire them."

The \$48,644 IMLS grant was used to gather information from statewide stakeholders about specific needs for standards in <u>eight key industries</u> identified by the <u>Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development</u> that could benefit from improved access to standards. The project also identified standards that promulgate DEIA and further the <u>United Nations Sustainable Development Goals</u>, with a focus on standards not widely available in Pennsylvania libraries.

Ultimately, about 164 standards were acquired, including standards from the American Welding Society, the American Petroleum Institute, the American National Standards Institute, the International Electrotechnical Commission, and the International Organization for Standardization.

A number of standards either directly addressed DEIA or touched on it tangentially. Examples include:

- ISO 30415: Human resource management Diversity and inclusion;
- ISO 21902: Tourism and related services Accessible tourism for all Requirements and recommendations;

As Pennsylvania's land-grant university, Penn State makes its library collections and other materials available to the public to borrow for free.
