



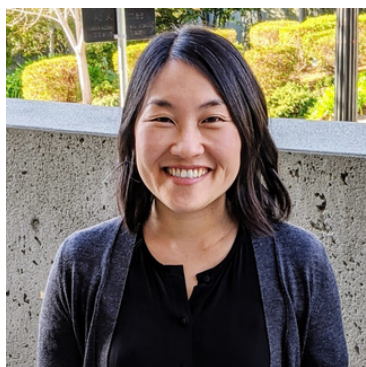

become much shorter!

Summer also brings the ASEE Annual Conference and the chance to meet and share ideas with fellow ELD members. Chelsea Leachman and the planning committee have created a terrific program with a workshop on integrating intercultural competencies into engineering information literacy instruction and two special sessions featuring timely topics—an AI teaching exchange and a panel on how librarians can support evidence synthesis projects in engineering—in addition to the traditional technical sessions, posters, lightning talks, and social events. The Annual Conference marks the turnover for Division officers: Congratulations to our newly elected Secretary/Treasurer, Erin Rowley, and Director, Denise Wetzel! Thanks to everyone who ran as candidates, and many thanks to everyone who voted. We had the second-highest voting rate since 2012 with 129 ballots completed out of 231 sent – a voting rate of 55.8%.

The Executive Committee confirmed the appointments of three new committee chairs: Matthew Frenkel for Accreditation and Standards (2024–2026), Aja Bettencourt-McCarthy for Membership (2024–2026), and Aditi Gupta as co-chair of Publications (2024–2026). We are also looking for a volunteer to serve on the new ASEE Commission on [P-12 Engineering Education](#); though not many of our institutions serve P-12 students, some of us participate in outreach activities on campus to P-12 groups, or have P-12 aged students in our personal lives. At the Annual Conference in June I will be completing my term as Division Chair; I look forward to welcoming Chelsea as the new Chair of the ELD. Thank you to all the current and past members of the Executive Committee and the Extended Executive Committee for your guidance and support during my last 3 years as an ELD officer. It was truly a wonderful learning experience, and I am honored and humbled that you elected me to office. ## ASEE INTERDIVISIONAL TOWN HALL UPDATE

Each year at the ASEE Annual Conference, divisions come together to co-sponsor the Interdivisional Town Hall (ITH), providing the opportunity for members from different divisions and attendees to come together to discuss topics of interest across the entire ASEE membership. This year's discussion will focus on the student experience and how we as faculty and instructors may make a difference. We will explore several important topics related to students' experiences in navigating being engineering students and becoming future engineers.

The first half will allow for intimate, roundtable conversations based on provided discussion prompts; the second half of the Town Hall will briefly introduce KEEN, the Kern Entrepreneurial Engineering Network, and a framework for faculty to engage students via curiosity, connections, and creating value in the classroom. Participants will collaboratively engage with [EngineeringUnleashed.com](#) resources to realize activities for their engineering courses.

Both parts of the Town Hall will lead directly to roundtable discussions to share recommendations and generate ideas. Individuals will be asked to share and apply their skills, knowledge, and expertise to these conversations in crafting shareable deliverables for guiding future effort.

### TREASURER'S REPORT

ASEE's fiscal year is from October 1st to September 30th. We are currently in FY24 (Oct 1, 2023 – Sept 30, 2024).

Below are descriptions of the two account types maintained by ASEE for the ELD, followed by financial updates from FY24.

#### **BASS Account (Banking and Accounting Services System)**

The BASS Account was ELD's principal account until 2016. Money in this account is carried over from one fiscal year to the next, though ASEE encourages divisions to spend down their BASS Account, as its purpose is to support the mission and vision of ASEE and the ELD. At this point, the monies held in this account are partially unavailable to ELD, and repayment to the divisions is undetermined, but will not happen in FY24.

#### **Conference Account**

Starting at the 2016 Annual Conference, the Conference Account was established as a pass-through account to pay for conference-related activities. It has become the ELD's de-facto principal account since most of our business revolves around conference programming, awarding stipends for conference travel, and conference-related expenses. The 30% transfer fee between the conference and BASS accounts has been discontinued. After all our conference expenses are paid, the remaining monies in the Conference Account are transferred to the BASS Account.

As many of you know, the accounts for divisions within ASEE have been frozen and continue to be partially frozen due to the issues with ASEE finances. ASEE held two finance related webinars this year, one focused on updating the field units on October 19, 2023, and a financial office hours meeting with ASEE COO Patti Greenawalt on February 12, 2024 ([recording](#)). Highlights of the meetings:

- FY24 (Oct 1, 2023 – Sept 30, 2024) membership dues are placed in our BASS account as they come in and are available for our use.
- Other revenue generated in FY23 (sponsorships, etc.) that carried over to FY24 BASS is available for us to use.

- Unavailable BASS funds will eventually be made available in the future. The timeline for making unavailable funds available is undetermined but will not happen in FY24. The ASEE Board of Directors remains committed to making these funds available, but must address external, legally binding payments first before repaying BASS accounts.
- ELD is still able to put FY24 sponsorships and other donations into our "conference" account that was established a few years ago, and any remaining funds in this account will be transferred to our BASS account for FY25.
- ASEE has been working on a process to change the way financial statements are done, which is why statements have been very delayed.

ASEE Accounting sent an ELD financial statement for September 30, 2023 on January 29, 2024, showing an available BASS Balance of \$11,528.07. However, the initial September 30, 2023 statement was missing many deposits and expenses that were recorded in the ELD FY23 ledger. Chelsea Leachman (ASEE ELD Secretary/Treasurer for FY23) and I communicated with Patti Greenawalt (ASEE COO) and ASEE Accounting Staff to rectify the errors and obtain a corrected statement, which was used to create the tables below.

We're thrilled to announce that the 2024 Annual Conference in Portland is just over a month away! Kick off your ELD activities with a powerful workshop! Sunday afternoon, join ELD for "Integrating Intercultural Competencies into Engineering Information Literacy Instruction." Led by Heather A. Tuesday morning starts with the ELD Business Meeting, where breakfast will be provided. Our PIC Chair, Elliot Douglas, will join us to update us on the organization. The business meeting is open to all and is a great chance for all members to learn about ELD, including ways to contribute to the division.

Next, dive into the intricacies of systematic reviews and meta-analyses with the panel "Opaque and Unreproducible Systematic Reviews - Oh No! How Librarians Can Support Evidence Synthesis Projects in Engineering." Join Margaret Phillips, Jason B. Reed, Dave Zwicky (Purdue University), Erin M. # SCHOLARLY COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT

Over the past year, the ELD Scholarly Communication Committee (SCC) added three new members and saw the departures of three. Current members are: Bill Bowman, Erin Burns, Cari Kaurlo, Mel DeSart (Chair), Julia Gelfand, Paula Johnson, Sylvia Jones, Erica Newcome, Georgette Nicolosi, David Pixton, Graham Sherriff, and Marina Zhang.

The Committee has:

- Reviewed and updated the [Engineering and Applied Science Societies OA Policies](#) resource in both May and November.
- A subgroup of the SCC completed a review and revision of [Open Textbooks for Engineering](#), a relatively new resource that aggregates open access textbooks in engineering. A second update of that resource has just been completed.
- Information about both of the resources above was shared with ELD members and with a broader sci-tech librarian audience. In addition, the Open Textbook resource was shared even more broadly to ASEE membership, including engineering teaching faculty, through ASEE HUB.
- Just after the completion and submission of last year's annual report, we found out that the Open Textbooks for Engineering resource won the 2023 ELD Innovation in Access to Engineering Information Award. The award was formally announced over ELD-L, and the award presentation happened during the ELD business meeting at the 2023 ASEE conference.
- A second subgroup finished reviewing and updating the [Punch List of Best Practices for Electronic Resources](#) from 2005. The new iteration, [Best Practices for Electronic Resources](#), was completed and was endorsed in October 2023 by the ELD Executive Committee on behalf of ELD.
- Another subgroup of the SCC has been working on a project to identify best practices associated with engineering preprints. That work is nearly complete as of this writing. One output from that effort is the webinar Preprint Repositories for the Engineering Researcher, held on April 23rd, 2024.
- An SC Committee "[Overview of the Nelson Memo](#)" is in the last stages of revision and will be sent to the ELD Executive Committee for comment and endorsement over the next few weeks.
- The Committee also discussed the possibility of moving to a staggered-term co-chairs model in the future. That discussion will continue at some point during the coming year.

In addition, Mel occasionally reported on the work/progress ASEE Committee on Scholarly Publications. The Chair of the ELD Scholarly Communication Committee was asked to serve on that group and may ultimately have an ongoing/continuing seat on

## AWARDS COMMITTEE UPDATE

The Awards Committee is pleased to announce the 2024 winners of the following awards: Homer I. Bernhardt for Distinguished Service, Innovation in Access to Engineering Information, Best Publication, and Early Career.

The ASEE ELD 2024 **Homer I. Bernhardt Distinguished Service Award** goes to Bruce Neville, formerly of Texas A&M University, in recognition of his exceptional career contributions. Bruce's nomination package clearly showcased his remarkable dedication not only to the various institutions where he worked, but also to the field of Engineering Librarianship, particularly through his involvement with, and service to, ASEE and ELD.

With nearly three decades of service as a subject librarian in science and engineering disciplines at three universities, including his most recent tenure at Texas A&M University, Bruce served as an instructor, mentor, and invaluable colleague. During this period, he undertook a variety of roles, ranging from reference librarian, collection development coordinator, interim development officer, and director of interlibrary loan. Notably, Bruce advocated for the use of open textbooks, supported student entrepreneurial endeavors, and actively engaged with the faculty senate at Texas A&M. Remarkably, his exceptional contributions were recognized with awards for excellence in service and research in librarianship at all three universities where he worked.

Bruce's service to the ELD is truly commendable. Serving in over 30 distinct roles including nominating chair, division chair, program chair, and treasurer/secretary, among others, he has played a pivotal role in advancing the mission of the organization. His involvement extended to various committees and initiatives, including the ASEE Commission on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, to which he served as the ELD delegate. He has also been a presenter, moderator, panelist, and facilitator at many ELD programs during ASEE conferences. Bruce's commitment has been instrumental in fostering a more diverse, equitable, and inclusive environment in ELD especially, and in engineering librarianship as a whole.

Outside of ELD, Bruce contributed significantly to the STEM Librarians South conference, serving on the steering committee, and helping to lead the group in planning annual conferences. He also served the Greater Western Library Alliance (GWLA) on several committees and task forces. Additionally, his involvement with the Texas Master Naturalist Program, particularly on the training committee, highlights his broader impact beyond the academic sphere.

His profound impact on faculty, students, and colleagues, characterized by his

networking, mentoring, and inspirational leadership, has left an indelible mark on those he has touched. His many contributions as a librarian, his scholarship, and his “exemplary dedication” to the organizations he belonged to, made him, according to his colleagues, a “multi-faceted librarian” and “the perfect person to receive this award”. The committee completely agrees that Bruce is truly deserving of the Homer I. Bernhardt Distinguished Service Award and extends heartfelt congratulations to him. We wish him continued success in his retirement.

The **Innovation in Access to Engineering Information Award** goes to Chelsea Leachman, Erin Rowley, Margaret Phillips, and Daniela Solomon for **“Teaching and Collecting Technical Standards.”** This resource was described as “unique and novel” in many ways, because it brings “clarity and order” to a topic that can be “confusing and challenging”. The resource was found to be very “readable,” in that it expertly breaks down complex information into easily digestible segments. Committee members recognized its significance as a much-needed resource, providing practical guidance for librarians engaged in teaching standards. What is transformative about the resource is that it adeptly “brings together so many disciplines and resources in one place”, showcasing how “pervasive standards are throughout industry and society”, an often-overlooked fact of our modern world. This resource is not only a great contribution to the engineering information literature, but it can also be used as a ready reference and collection development tool, and as a vital resource for those involved in teaching technical standards. Congratulations to the authors!

The award for **Best Publication** goes to Eric Schares for his publication **“Impact of the 2022 OSTP memo: A bibliometric analysis of US federally funded publications, 2017–2021”**. The nominated papers in this category were all notable contenders, but what stood out the most about this winner was that members of the committee felt that the publication provided invaluable insights into the implications of the Nelson Memo. The author took the very complex challenge of understanding the scope of federally funded research articles and made it clearer and more comprehensible for us to better gauge the potential impact of this new policy framework. This was done by investigating the characteristics of these research publications over a five-year period, from 2017–2021. Committee members were impressed with the detailed methodology that the author used to quantify the volume of relevant publications within this period, and to highlight the federal funding agencies, institutions, journals and publishers responsible for producing such volume. This paper is relevant to engineering research in that a large proportion of the research in the field is federally funded, even though the paper’s findings are also applicable to all STEM fields. Congratulations, Eric!

The **Early Career** award goes to J. Denice Lewis, Research and Instruction Librarian for Engineering and Science at Wake Forest University. Denice's nomination and accompanying letters of support were notably strong, clearly highlighting her many achievements since assuming the role of Engineering Librarian. Since joining ELD in 2019, Denice has been actively engaged in various activities within the organization, including participation in the annual ASEE conferences where she has moderated a technical session, delivered lightning talks, served on the 2023 ELD planning committee, and collaborated on a workshop proposal. Her integral role in the inaugural ELD Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Committee was particularly highlighted, underscoring her commitment to advancing these values within the profession.

In addition to her active involvement in ELD, she has also assumed leadership roles in other professional library organizations, notably the North Carolina Library Association. Although an Engineer by training, Denice's professional journey has encompassed diverse experiences, ranging from culinary arts to academia. She began her career in engineering librarianship at Wake Forest University, tasked to work with the newly created engineering department. This could have been a significant challenge to anyone, yet Denice embraced it confidently, quickly establishing herself as an integral asset to the department and its development. Additionally, her efforts in guiding high school students and nurturing colleague development through mentorship initiatives are commendable testimonies to her dedication and versatility.

Denice's academic and professional background has provided her with a varied skill set as a dynamic instructor, presenter, and librarian. Upon review of her breadth of work and the profound impact she has had on her colleagues, the committee wholeheartedly concurs that Denice embodies the essence of the award, demonstrating an ongoing commitment to the profession and ELD. It is with great pride and enthusiasm that the committee extends its heartfelt congratulations to Denice, recognizing her as truly worthy of this accolade.

The number of subscribers to ELDnet-L rebounded a bit from last year's drop (which was largely caused by Elsevier cleaning up their email address records). But the Elsevier email address hiccup aside, there are still DOZENS (over 50 at last check) of ELD members (who are thus ELD-L subscribers) who are NOT also subscribed to ELDnet-L. Why? I have no idea. But those people are missing out on well over half of the engineering library-related list traffic that subscribers to both lists are receiving.

For ELD-L, the number of subscribers has bounced back up significantly, which is great because it means more members in ELD. Those ELD members with e-mail addresses who agree to be subbed to the list directly determine the number of list subscribers. Given that a tiny number of ASEE members (who are not librarians) sometimes

choose to join ELD but do not want to be subscribed to ELD-L, the number of ELD-L subscribers will often be slightly lower than the total number of ELD members.

Now in his fourth year as co-editor of the ELD e-lists is Paul McMonigle from Penn State. Paul handles the posting (or not) of most submissions to the lists, while I deal with new list subscribers, drops, and subscriber clean-up, as well as most problems.

Fall 2023

- **Patents & Trademarks:** October 3, 2023.
  - “For the Patent & Trademarks: We had 178 people registered and 106 attendees. From the twelve people who completed the post-event survey, the event had a 4.7 out of 5 for usefulness. The attendees had good things to say and appreciated seeing how a patent instructional course was taught. - **ELD Open Forum:** November, 9, 2023

Spring 2024

- **Preprint Repositories for the Engineering Researcher:** April 23, 2024
  - A panel presentation of the Preprints Subcommittee of ELD's Scholarly Communication Committee. We had a total of 76 attendees from 134 registrations. The webinar discussed how preprint servers may support researchers in being compliant with the 2022 Nelson Memo, in which the OSTP

provided guidance that federal agency grantees make their research outputs freely and immediately accessible to the public. The session looked at the increasing number of preprint repositories associated with the engineering disciplines, and covered considerations for and against posting preprints, as well as best practices for the use of repositories.
